FEATURES

The spring cavefish is a small (less than three and one-half inches), uniformly grey to black fish with small eyes, small scales, and a salamander-like appearance.

BEHAVIORS

The spring cavefish is troglophilic (occurring within caves, but not exclusively) and inhabits shallow, densely vegetated water in springs and spring-fed streams. They are active primarily after dark and their diet consists mostly of amphipods. It has been suggested their small eyes function only as a light-sensory organ and that they do not see images. In Illinois, they are found in caves near the Mississippi River.
