FEATURES

The name "waterleaf" comes from the coloration on the leaves that may give them the appearance of being stained with water. Flowers are white or pale purple, arising on a single stalk. Leaves are large and have five to seven lobes. The plant ranges from one to three feet tall.

Virginia waterleaf grows in woodlands throughout Illinois. Flowers are produced from April through July.
