**Project Objectives:**

The objectives of this project were to complete a pilot survey to determine present occupancy of historic sites and locate new sites for the ornate box turtle in Illinois. The surveys assessed presence/absence; gathered data on any live specimens encountered and marked turtles for future identification. Since recent records are available for only 11 counties of the previously known 45 counties of existence, these surveys will begin to give a more current picture of where this species continues to exist in these parts of Illinois. We also hope that this pilot would provide a model for future survey work, and long-term monitoring of the ornate box turtle throughout its historic range in Illinois.

**Completed Project Summary:**

The original project was amended to include the use of specially trained Boykin Spaniels to survey for ornate box turtle at sites across the state in addition to volunteer survey on foot or by car. The use of the dogs proved to be instrumental in finding the turtles in all types of habitat. Nearly all of the 20 turtles found over the survey period were found by the dogs with the exception of several of the turtles that were found at Goose Lake State Park. This was due to the very recent prescribed burn at Collins Station Prairie that cleared the vegetation and made it much easier to find the turtles. The downside to the late burn/early warm weather was that two turtles were killed in the fire and two additional ones were injured and had to be removed from the site to seek veterinary care. Both were taken to a veterinarian by Dan Kirk (IDNR) but neither survived. Twenty-eight visits were made in the spring of 2011 and the spring of 2012 with the Turtle Dogs and four additional visits were made to two other locations by foot and by car by volunteers. Overall 31 visits were made to 29 different locations in 13 counties. Twenty individual ornate box turtles were found at seven different sites in six counties.



The Boykin Spaniels will bring back turtles in their mouths, like most hunting dogs they have very “soft” mouths and do not harm the turtles. They also do not distinguish between turtle species – this one got bit in the nose by a red-eared slider it picked up at Wayne Fitzgerald State Park.

### **Project Methodology:**

The original proposal was to rely heavily on the use of volunteers to search historic locations on foot or by road surveys after a rain through areas of potential habitat; both of these methods have historically been effective when populations were larger. After submitting the original proposal we learned of the use of specially trained dogs on surveys completed by US Fish & Wildlife Service at the Upper Mississippi River Wildlife Refuge. The use of the dogs has been shown to be much more effective than human (on foot) surveyors in finding these elusive turtles, particularly when they are under any kind of vegetation or slightly buried in the ground. Based on discussions with Ed Britton from USFWS we requested a modification to the original grant scope to include the use of dogs as part of our survey. Contracting with the Tennessee Turtle Dogs was also very cost effective with rates of \$175-\$225 per day plus travel. Overall the dogs found 18 of the 20 turtles found. The Tennessee Turtle Dogs have also been contracted by several other site managers or researchers in the state including multiple contracts at the Upper Mississippi Wildlife Refuge in 2010 and 2011, a researcher working at Nachusa

Grasslands in 2012 and they will be working with the Forest Preserve District of Will County in 2013.

*Site Selection:*

Historically the Ornate Box Turtle was found in 45 counties across the state representing areas within the Southern Till Plain, Rock River Hill Country, Kankakee Sands and marginal areas of the Grand Prairie Natural Divisions. Survey sites were identified in each natural division based on record data from the Illinois Natural History Survey that did not have recent (after 2000) records of the turtles. We started with a list of sites in the Illinois counties of Stephenson, Winnebago, Ogle, Carroll, Lee, Whiteside, Kankakee, Will & Grundy; Fulton, Tazewell, Mason, Menard, Cass, Pike, Morgan, Sangamon, Macoupin, Montgomery, Shelby, Coles, & Edgar; Cumberland, Clark, Jasper, Crawford, Effingham, Fayette, Bond, Madison, St. Clair, Monroe, Randolph, Clinton, Washington, Perry, Jackson, Marion, Jefferson, Franklin, Clay, Richland, & Wayne. We worked with Illinois DNR District Biologists to further refine site selection based on whether or not appropriate habitat was still available, landowner willingness, and whether or not Prairie Chickens were on site. Preserve managers did not want the dogs to be used on sites during the Prairie Chicken nesting and fledging period. Most sites identified were on state owned lands.



*Survey Protocols:*

Protocols for this survey were developed based on similar surveys for other sand associated herps. Equipment kits consisted of calipers, two spring scales, and files for gathering information on captured turtles. A soil thermometer, kestrel weather meter and GPS were also used to collect site information. Search Effort forms (based on similar forms developed by the Illinois Natural History Survey for amphibian and reptile surveys) were filled out for every site (Attachment 1) with information on site location, date, time, weather, soil temperature, observers, time started and ended, number Ornate Box Turtles found, numbers of other reptiles found. Additionally, Box Turtle Capture Sheets were completed for every individual found (Attachment 2). This included information on location, weather conditions, soil temp, habitat description, size, sex, distinctive markings and location of file notch. All individuals were notched with a file along one of the marginal scutes of the carapace for future identification, photographed, and then released at its site of capture the same day. Weather and location data was collected at the beginning of each survey prior to letting the dogs start. Start and stop time was recorded and “penalty time” was tracked when observers

needed to stop to collect data on captured turtles. Dogs were guided through as much of the available habitat on the site and observers searched while walking behind the dogs. Total search time was recorded to quantify search effort. Weather information was also recorded at the end of the survey.

**Survey Data:**

Twenty-eight visits were made in the spring of 2011 and the spring of 2012 with the Tennessee Turtle Dogs and four additional visits were made to two other locations by foot and by car by volunteers. Overall 31 visits were made to 29 different locations in 13 counties. Twenty individuals were found at seven different sites in six counties. In addition, while at the Washington County site, 28 eastern box turtles were found by the Tennessee Turtle dogs during the same period during which two ornate box turtles were found.

As an initial statewide survey we were successful at confirming presences in six counties – Grundy, Kankakee, Mason, Pike, Washington and Will, but there is still much work to do. Weather conditions in 2012 were not ideal with cooler than normal temperatures during the April and May period following egress from hibernation, followed by severe drought and high temperatures in the summer. Ornate Box Turtles are generally not very active during cooler early season temperatures, and may have remained buried to escape hot and dry conditions later in the season. This was also confirmed with conversations with Ed Britton from USFWS at the Upper Mississippi Wildlife Refuge where radio tagged turtles were not nearly as active in early May 2012 as they were in previous years. Several sites have a lot more suitable habitat than could be surveyed with the time allotted including Goose Lake SP, the Kankakee Sands region, and Winnebago County. It would also be advised to visit more sites in the Pearl/Nebo area where there are a number of private lands that have suitable habitat contiguous with where we found 4 individuals. IDNR Natural Heritage Biologist Dean Corgiat reported a landowner contact in early 2013 during which the landowner showed him a shell of a dead ornate box turtle from his property. The site where the shell originated was >3 miles from the site where they were detected by dogs in 2011. There is a great deal of similar habitat in this part of Pike County. Overall the number of individuals we found does not bode well for a species that take 10-15 years to reach maturity and has low reproduction rates. From data collected outside of this project there are only two sites in the state that have numbers that may represent viable populations – the greater Upper Mississippi Wildlife Refuge area and the Nachusa Grasslands area. Exact survey locations can be provided as necessary.

**Permits:**

The principal investigator applied for and received all needed permits including a scientific collecting permit, Illinois Nature Preserves Commission permit, Permit for surveying on state owned lands and an endangered/threatened species permit to allow temporary holding and data collection of any live or dead ornate box turtle encountered by them. We also received a permit from the Forest Preserve District of Will County.

**Budget Summary:**

We are requesting originally requested \$9,780 to cover volunteer mileage and contractual services with the Tennessee Turtle Dogs. Final expenditures totaled \$5,529.66 as detailed in the budget table below. Because all of the volunteers are trained professionals, or advanced amateur naturalists, the contributions of these initial volunteers are estimated at the equivalent of \$40 hour. Matching funds totaled \$16,480.78, providing an ~84% match to grant funds expended.



ROCKFORD — A search for a threatened turtle species in Winnebago County forest preserve confirmed what officials expected: They're hard to find.

Conservationists spent two days last week searching the Sugar River corridor for ornate box turtles but found none.

The turtle has been found in Winnebago County preserves in the past and was the subject of this week because the sandy-soil prairies here make an ideal habitat for the rare reptile.

"We were hoping to see a better population because the habitat is right, but the population is a small, sparse population," said Jennifer Hammer, a land conservation and restoration specialist with The Conservation Foundation, who coordinated the survey.

The small turtle, distinguished by bright yellow lines on a dark olive shell, can be difficult to find. It burrows into the sandy soil to hibernate during the winter. It also digs below ground to escape heat. The state has recognized the species as threatened — the level below endangered.

### Turtle dogs

Specially trained dogs offered some help to conservationists from the Winnebago County Forest Preserve District and The Conservation Foundation in the search. The dogs, in this case, spaniels, came from Tennessee with owner John Rucker. Rucker owns Turtledogs, a company that helps researchers track down turtles. The chocolate-colored, wavy-haired dogs stay with Rucker, who occasionally calls them in or bellows out for them to "find me a turtle." The dogs are trained to track the scent of a turtle, follow its path, pick it up with a "soft mouth" and return it to Rucker's hand. The turtles typically protect themselves during the ordeal by retracting their heads and legs.

The dogs didn't find any turtles in Winnebago County during searches Tuesday and Wednesday. It's proof that the turtles are few and far between.

"If there's a breeding population, they won't miss it," Rucker said.

### Possibly endangered

Hammer received a nearly \$10,000 grant from the Illinois Department of Natural Resources to survey ornate box turtles in Winnebago County and other counties.

The data she collects will be shared with the Illinois Endangered Species Protection Board, which guides its decisions when the state's list of threatened and endangered species is reviewed, which happens at least once every five years. Hammer said their findings, so far, suggest the ornate box turtle to the Illinois endangered species list.

Ornate box turtles had historically occupied 44 counties in the state, but when the spe in 2009 it was found to occupy only about 21 counties, said Anne Mankowski, executi Illinois Endangered Species Protection Board. There are 484 endangered and threate Illinois, which includes 332 plants and 152 animals.

### Why it's threatened

The decline of the species is primarily from habitat destruction. The turtle can protect predators by retracting into its shell, but that doesn't protect it from cars. They're ofte cross roads, Hammer said.

The loss of habitat makes work by conservationists at the Winnebago County Forest P important for turtles, Hammer said. Annual controlled burns, which help curtail invas also help open up prairie so they're more suitable for the turtle, she said.

Wild ornate turtles are also on the decline because they're sought by poachers, who ill them from preserves and sell them on the black market, Mankowski said. Hammer sa have to be careful not to reveal precise locations of turtles because doing so would attr

Ornate box turtles "don't reach a breeding age until they're 15 to 20 years. They'll lay c anywhere from two to six eggs," Hammer said. "So you can see, if you start taking indi population and they're not running into each other as often for mating, then you get tl takes so long for them to get to a reproducing age."

## **Outdoors: Turtle-sniffing dogs hot on trail**

Gretta, Jay Bird, Jeanny Wren and Snapper all came to Iroquois County to go turtle hunting.

But these curly-coated boykin spaniels from east Tennessee are a different kind of hunter.

Their mission is to sniff out evidence that the ornate box turtle is still surviving in Iroquois, Kankakee and Will counties.

It's a big job for the dogs -- and a small band of researchers -- who have only a week to get it done.

On Wednesday the dogs were ranging across a rolling landscape of sand savanna, dunes and swales in northeastern Iroquois County. Thursday the team probed Kankakee County turtle terrain in Pembroke.

Today they will be turtle-sniffing in Will County for a species that is becoming increasingly rare in Illinois.

"The ornate box turtle was once found in 42 counties, but is now found in only 11 counties," said Jennifer Hammer, who is leading the study for the Conservation Foundation and its partners.

Remote and rolling landscapes in three local counties are the most likely sanctuaries for the small turtles, which were once hunted for their colorful shells.

#### Research-based management

"We have a \$10,000 grant from Illinois Wildlife Preservation Checkoff Fund for a statewide study to determine the presence and population of the ornate box turtles," Hammer said.

"This is not taxpayer money," noted Kim Romaine of the Illinois Nature Preserves Commission. "This is the voluntary checkoff donation on the state income tax from people who want to support wildlife preservation."

"We are in the second year of our two-year study, but the grant only allows us one week each year to work with the dogs," Hammer said. "After that we depend on volunteers and it becomes much more difficult."

"The dogs help us determine if a viable population exists here," said Rob Littiken, manager of The Nature Conservancy's Kankakee Sands Project.

"The question we are asking is are we targeting habitat without the proper research? Without field studies we are shooting in the dark."

"If we know the turtles are here, then we may change the management objectives," Romaine said. "For example, controlled burns of the prairie might be done earlier to avoid damage when the turtles become active in April."

#### Turtle dogs part of a rare breed

The dogs, owned by John Ruker, are among a small number of specially trained turtle dogs around the country.

"The boykin spaniels are the state dog of South Carolina," Ruker said. "They are very competitive and will watch one another to see what they are finding." Their waterproof coats and keen sense of smell make them ideal hunting dogs.

But right out of the box, three of the spaniels began excitedly excavating head-deep into the sandy soil Thursday afternoon.

"Oh not there, there are pocket gophers all around here," Romaine said.

"That's not proper behavior," Ruker said, chiding his 2-year-old charges. "They probably smelled a mouse or gopher."

But ferreting out gophers is not allowed in this protected area.

The plains pocket gopher is the only species of gopher found in Illinois and is abundant across sections of eastern Iroquois and Kankakee counties.

Success came Thursday

Wednesday's hunt turned up empty, but early Thursday morning the dogs started finding turtles in eastern Kankakee County.

"We have two so far and here comes a dog with a third one," said Rob Littiken, manager for The Natural Conservancy's Kankakee Sands Project.

A kindred species, the state-threatened Blanding's turtle, has been found surviving in the Kankakee Sands area.

The survey team will measure, weigh, mark and release all the turtles found. "We can learn a lot by a

quick inspection," Hammer said. "The age can be determined by the turtle's size and by its shell.

"It is important to collect this data now because these turtles are uncommon to rare across most of their traditional range."
