Motors of 25 horsepower or less are allowed. Sail boating, swimming and water skiing are prohibited. Boat and water safety is urged.

- Fishing—Bank fishing is available at all boat access areas. Considerable acreage is open for bank fishing where parking is present. Posted site specific regulations for bass and crappie are enforced. All fishing tournaments must be scheduled through the site office.
- Picnicking, camping concessions—Toilets, drinking water and picnic facilities are available at the main access area. A private campground is located just to the north of the main access area. Bait, supplies and food can be obtained there.
- Hunting—Deer hunting is allowed in season. Check site specific regulations at site office.
- Trapping—A controlled aquatic furbearer trapping program allows the harvest of a valued renewable resource.


